Other Suggestions	 Visit a nursery, observe how toddlers and young children are spoken to Visit some KS1 lessons and consider how students' language is different to that observed in a nursery When out and about, listen in to group conversations. Note their word choices and the structure of the words they speak Think about your own language and where you use it – does your language differ when speaking to and communicating with different groups of people?
